A Message from our President Peter Holmes

We are at the start of another year and what a busy year we have ahead.

We are close to finishing renovations to our Tulo Valley Propagating Unit. A new fence, gate and flooring have been erected and installed. We have also installed a new air extraction system consisting of a two exhaust fans and four air circulation fans, which are controlled by heat sensors to keep the heat down, together with a new floor and path. Sliding doors have also been repaired. A new water supply, pump etc. has been completed so that we know our water is good. Finally a state of the art mister system is in place. We are just waiting for the hurricane season to pass us by before installing the new roof material, which we have in stock. Some of our members will still be propagating at home and with the addition of the tunnel propagating this will add to our stock for sale to the public.

Our Twenty Entry Rose Show proved a great success last year, so this year we are planning to have two twenty entry shows one in November and one in February. The February show will be held at the Horticultural Hall together with a catered lunch and we have invited a very motivational speaker, Mr Leo A. Watermeier, Curator of the old rose garden in Louis Armstrong Park in New Orleans, Louisiana. He is a founding member of the New Orleans Old Garden Rose Society and has presented programs about old roses to numerous groups in the New Orleans area, to the Dallas Area Historical Rose Society and throughout the United States.

The Twenty Entry Shows will now have an award and prize certificates presented at the AGM. A member has decided to purchase an award and provide gift certificates for the next 5 years to encourage everyone to enter and ensure the success of the limited entry shows.

We will have a busy year ahead and the success of the society is all due to you its members. Please volunteer where you can, assist when asked, bring a friend along to the monthly meetings, and spread the word to potential new members. Our executive are open to ideas, so please let us know your thoughts and make this a great year!

For all months except the AGM in May sizes are:-

Class A – 24" wide x 24" deep, NO height restriction.

Class B - 15" wide x 15" deep x 15" high.

Class C - 9" wide x 9" deep x 9" high, design must be more than 4" high, wide and deep this does not apply to the diagonal dimension.

Class D - Shadow Box – The aim is to create a 'Picture' within a frame, no titles are given. The plant material may extend forward out of the box to create a 3D effect but must NOT touch the Interior or Frame of the box. There are different size boxes available on first come-first serve basis or reserve a box by calling Alison Masters at 236 8917.

Shadow box sizes are: - 10"x13", 18"x 22", 10 1/2"x 13", 10"x 7", 11"x 15", 11" x 23", 15" x 19".

Internationally accepted Rules for Floral Art

- 1) Plant material must predominate over all other componenents.
- 2) Plant material must be in water or water retaining material, unless such plant material is known to remain turgid for the duration of the show.
- 3) Artificial plant material must **NOT** be used.
- 4) Painted and/or artificially coloured or treated plant material may be used unless otherwise stated in the schedule.
- 5) An exhibit may include accessories such as bases, drapes, backgrounds and title cards unless otherwise stated.


The Bermuda Rose Society requires that locally grown Roses and/or plant material from the Rosaceae family must predominate in all arrangements. Some examples are apple, cotoneaster, loquat, peach, pear, potentilla, pyracantha, spirea, strawberry, dewberry, yeddo-hawthorne.

Roses of any classification may be used and need NOT have been grown by the Exhibitor. Other locally grown flowers and foliage may be included.

Plant materials are living plants, flowers, grasses and branches of bushes or trees. All plant material should be in scale with the roses used and must be appropriate in size, colour and texture to complement the roses and be subordinate in the design.

Class A, B, and C designs should be in scale within the space allotted.

Rose Propagating classes

This is to invite you to come along to meetings at 9.30 am on three Saturday mornings in October to see how the new system will operate and to start putting our slips into the plastic propagation boxes already in the tunnel. All the required mixtures will be on hand in the tunnel, and we will be ready to go. Please bring with you a notebook/pen/ for notes, thin medical gloves which are easier to use for putting in small slips, water for yourself if it is warm, and an apron as you may get dirty...

The first meeting will be **at 9.30 am on October 8**th when we will show you the misting system and answer any questions you may have; we will also show you how to take slips from your own roses – where best to cut, how many leaflets should be left on, and to answer any other questions you may have.

Peter will take the second meeting on October 15th and you can bring your own cuttings from rose bushes and make slips from them and put them on the bench under the new misting system.

I will take the third meeting on 22nd October to answer any points raised, and to put more slips in.

We look forward to seeing you, and if you have any questions please email me back. Am happy to help.
