May 5th 2017 Annual General Meeting

Class A – 'Sailing into Summer' – 24" x 24" no height restriction

Class B - 'Colour Burst' - no size restriction

Class C - 'Where the Butterflies Dance' 15" x 15" no height restriction

For all months except the AGM in May sizes are :-

Class A – 24" wide x 24" deep, NO height restriction.

Class B - 15" wide x 15" deep x 15" high.

BESSIE'S ROSE

This yellow Hybrid Tea came to Bermuda in a bouquet of roses from un-named, unregistered Hybrid Tea seedlings at the Rose Test Gardens of the New York Botanic Garden. Considered unsuccessful, these seedlings were subsequently destroyed. The bouquet had been presented to Miss Bessie Ramsbottom during a visit to the Test Gardens. One rose was propagated by her nephew, Basil Hall, and has adapted fairly well to Bermuda conditions. It grows into a sturdy bush up to 5ft.(1.5m) tall. Leaves are dark green and glossy. New growth is burgundy. The blooms open from pointed buds and are a delicate clear yellow colour. Sets large round orange hips. This rose was named "Bessie's Rose" on the occasion of her 100th birthday in 1994.

As on previous "northern" outings, the visits have been arranged "back to back" so that those travelling from a greater distance could look for suitable overnight accommodation in this attractive area.

Thursday 29th June 2.00pm: Jackson's Wold, Sherburn, near Malton, North Yorkshire.

Visit with afternoon tea in Sarah and Richard Cundall's extensive and unusual garden with a multitude of exclusively old roses. Sarah's mother is Mrs June Baxter, of St Andrews, and members who came on the HRG Scottish tour in 2011 may recall a very enjoyable reception in Mrs Baxter's delightful rose-filled 'lang rigg' (long town garden).

Friday 30th June, 11am: Alnwick Castle Gardens, Alnwick, Northumberland.

Met by Trevor Jones, head gardener, who will give a short talk on the roses and their care at Alnwick. These huge redesigned gardens are noted for their modern waterworks and cascades, plus many other features including its 'Poison Garden', and rose gardens, especially the walled garden overflowing with roses. Red Barracks conversion into a home started in 1999 by Rose Society members, Michael Spurling and Micheal Whittle. It is situated on what is commonly known as the Spurling Compound on Speakers Drive, right on the waters of St George's Harbour. There are five homes shortly to be joined by a new cottage on the compound, all occupied by members of the Spurling family; the sons and relations of Sir Dudley Spurling, A former Speaker to the House of Parliament. Many thanks to Mike and Mike allowing the The Bermuda Rose Society to hold their annual Tea Party with an Teapot arrangement & decorated hat contest in their beautiful home and grounds. Both Mike & Mike are passionate gardeners spending

time in their garden when not traveling.

Below is some background on the property.

RED BARRACKS - a little history

The House and Surroundings

Believed to have been constructed during the US Civil War time boom in St.Georges, the building, now a residence, was built as a warehouse with a commercial style wharf on the foreshore. A rectangular two story building with no stain well and large doors to accept large crates clearly indicated its original purpose.

On the piono you will find a framed photograph clearly showing the building under construction – the rafter feet are being finished. Also clearly visible is the old shipyard in the distance, now owned by Will Lawrence but always known to us as "Meyers". The photo also shows a number of other stone buildings dotted around all of which have discopeared but we discovered many foundations during the conversion process. Those with the knowledge have suggested that the tree cover of cedars clearly indicates mid 19th century – they are sparse and low. Also discovered during the conversion process were seams of coal dust below ground, some over 18" in depth, along with granite rocks in the fill – probably ballast rocks from England dropped on shore when not needed and put to good use.

The property originally comprised Crown Land and part of what is still (although rarely) called Secretary's Point. The earliest decds in the family's possession are dated 16th June 1758 and comprise a "Royal Instruction of His Majesty King George II bearing date at the Court of Kensington setting apart land for the use of the Secretary and Provost Marshall General". Its during this period that the property housed a barracks of "Red Coats", hence the name "**Red Barracks**" which has stuck ever since and which I decided to maintain as the name of the house.

The property was "granted" to Andrew Belcher, a merchant of London, England on the 27th lone 1812 – presumably as part of a disposal of Crown Land to help finance the Napeleome Wars. It was sold to the "wife of Edward Speer and Robert Atcheson" in 1833, then to Thomas Alcock and others in 1864. At some time between then and the 1890's the property was conveyed to Robert Harley James by Edgar Campbell Zuill. In 1950 the property was conveyed to my uncle, Stewart Spurling, and my father, Sir Dudley Spurling, who owned the adjacent properties to the cast. Finally, it entered the sole ownership of Sir Dudley in 1956 following the death of Stewart. The property immediately to the north comprising the vegetable garden and recently built house known as Crow's Nest. (built by Chris Spurling, son of the late Stephen Spurling) was owned by the Wilkinson Estate and acquired by Sir Dudley in the 60's.
